

Against the law: Demonstrative pronouns *this, that, these, those*

When you want to talk about something depending on quantity and distance you use *this, that, these* or *those*. For example,

If a dog is near, you say '*this dog*'
If a dog is far, you say '*that dog*'



If there is more than one, then you use '*these*' if they are near and '*those*' if they are far from you. For example,

'these dogs are very near' -- *'those dogs are very far'*






