## A Hero in Disguise by Kate Paixão

1. A young woman wearing a big hat walked down the road carrying chickens. When she recognized a man coming toward her, she pulled a string tied to one of the chicken's legs. The chickens started squawking. Because of the noise, the man avoided her.

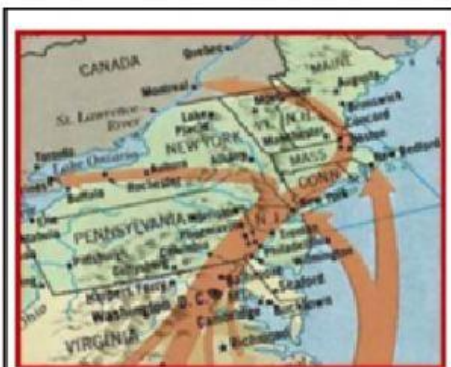
2. The woman was named Harriet Tubman. She was wearing a disguise. In fact, Harriet was an African American woman who was an escaped slave. The man who avoided her was a slaveholder who had once owned her. If he had recognized her, he would have tried to capture her again.



3. Harriet Tubman was born in 1820 to slave parents in Maryland. As a child, Harriet had a terrible and very hard life. From the early age of 6, she was forced to do backbreaking labor and was often beaten and always treated poorly. She watched her brothers and sisters be sold to other slave owners. When she was 12 years old she was hit in the head by an iron weight and suffered a brain injury which caused her to have seizures and narcolepsy, a disorder where she would fall asleep uncontrollably. Harriet's childhood taught her to be courageous and would change the future of hundreds of slaves.

4. Two hundred years ago, many African Americans were held as slaves just as Harriet was. Most slaves were in the southern United States. Tubman helped the slaves escape to the North and on to Canada. Many other people also helped. They hid escaping slaves in houses and churches along the way. This system, a group of people who worked to help free slaves, was called the Underground Railroad.

5. Harriet Tubman freed herself in 1851 using the Underground Railroad. Her journey to freedom was nearly a 90-mile-long walk to Philadelphia. Once she became free, she often thought of her family in Maryland who were still slaves. At this time though, the government passed a law making it illegal to help slaves escape. Even so, Harriet made many trips back to Maryland to help her relatives escape through the Underground Railroad. More laws were passed by the government to try to stop people from rescuing slaves. This made Harriet's work even more dangerous. In 11 years, Harriet returned to Maryland many times and rescued hundreds of slaves using the Underground Railroad.



Harriet Tubman used the Underground Railroad to help slaves escape slavery in the south and relocate to places in the north including New York and Canada.

6. Facing danger, Harriet Tubman showed courage every day. Slaveholders knew who she was and the police wanted to arrest her but she kept on doing her work to help others. Today, Harriet

Tubman is remembered as a brave leader who made the world a better place.
