Operating since 1974, the group is in the process of building a new outreach center where immigrants can find help with everything from legal matters to housing. The new building, which will open in the spring of next year, is a sign of the importance of the organization's role in the community.

Unlike many groups, Newcomer Outreach has recently received a financial boost in the form of a state

grant. "This increases our funding by about 40 percent," says Lisa Mandel, Newcomer's director. "Which means we can offer more kinds of help to more people."

But, like most groups, money isn't the only need. "We need volunteers to help in our efforts," says Lisa. "Volunteers are the lifeblood of our group. We'd be doing much, much less without them."
