

Dear parents, this week we will be looking at figurative language.

- **Alliteration** is when words start with the same sound:

For example, Sammy the slippery snake came sliding.

Alliteration is used in both written and spoken English. You can find examples in poetry, advertising and events commentary.

It is often used in newspaper headlines to grab the reader's attention.

- A **metaphor** is a word or a phrase used to describe something as if it were something else:

For example, "A wave of terror washed over him."

The terror isn't actually a wave, but a wave is a good way of describing the feeling.

"Jess is dynamite."

She's not made of dynamite, but it's a way to explain how exciting she is.

Jess as a stick of dynamite

- A **simile** describes something by comparing it to something else, using like or as:

The snake moved like a ripple on a pond.

It was as slippery as an eel.

Jess is as graceful as a gazelle.

Try using metaphors and similes to make your own poetry or other writing more descriptive and interesting.

- **Onomatopoeia** is a word which sounds like what it means.

'Thud', 'crash', 'bang' and 'buzz' are all examples.

- **Personification** is describing objects as if they are people.

For example, Jess's heart is racing at 100 miles per hour. A heart can't literally race, but it helps us to feel more involved in the story. Try using personification in your own writing and speech

- **Hyperbole** is an exaggeration for example:

He ran a million miles.

These shoes are killing me.

For the millionth time - stop it!
