

Comparing Fractions

We can compare fractions using <, > and =.

Rule 1: If the denominators of the two fractions are the same, the fraction with the larger numerator is greater.

E.g $\frac{7}{9}$ () $\frac{4}{9}$

Both have the same denominator, so we compare the numerators. Since $7 > 4$ our answer is

$$\frac{7}{9} (>) \frac{4}{9}$$

Compare the following fractions using <, > and =

a) $\frac{5}{7}$ $\frac{2}{7}$

b) $\frac{1}{3}$ $\frac{2}{3}$

c) $\frac{1}{4}$ $\frac{3}{4}$

d) $\frac{7}{8}$ $\frac{5}{8}$

e) $\frac{3}{5}$ $\frac{4}{5}$

f) $\frac{1}{6}$ $\frac{4}{6}$

Rule 2: When comparing fractions with different denominators we must first form equivalent fractions using the Lowest Common Multiple (LCM), before we compare the numerators.

E.g $\frac{4}{7}$ () $\frac{4}{5}$

The LCM of 5 and 7 is 35

$$\frac{4}{7} \begin{matrix} \times 5 \\ \times 5 \end{matrix} () \frac{4}{5} \begin{matrix} \times 7 \\ \times 7 \end{matrix}$$

$$\frac{20}{35} (<) \frac{28}{35} \quad \text{once you have your equivalent fractions, compare the numerators.}$$
