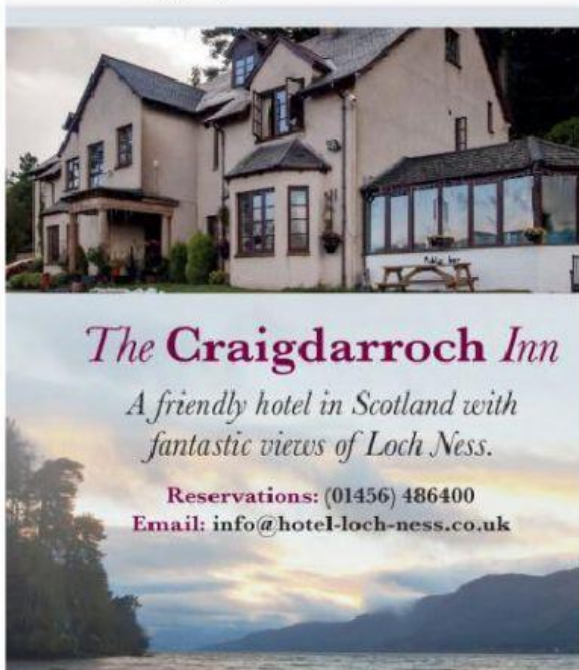

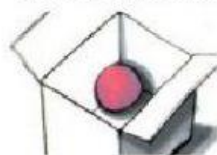

 R Well, some people say there is and some people say there isn't. Enjoy your stay. Breakfast is at 8.00.

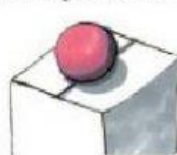

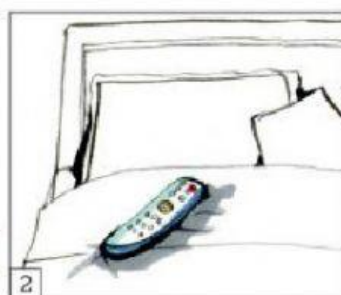

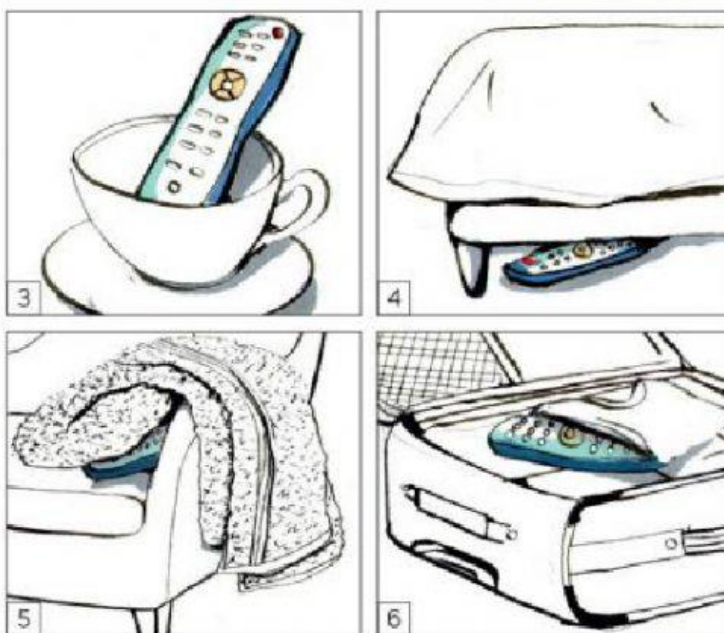

-	<b>There isn't</b> a phone. <b>There isn't</b> a bath.	<b>There aren't</b> <b>any</b> towels. <b>There aren't</b> <b>any</b> books.
?	<b>Is there</b> a TV? Yes, <b>there is</b> .	<b>Are there</b> <b>any</b> pictures? Yes, <b>there are</b> .
?	<b>Is there</b> a bath? No, <b>there isn't</b> .	<b>Are there</b> <b>any</b> towels? No, <b>there aren't</b> .

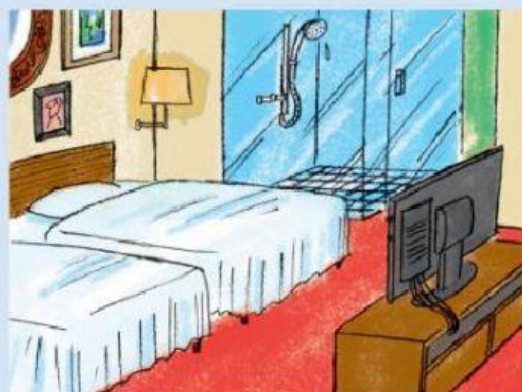
- There's a TV in my hotel room. = The room has a TV.

### some and any

There are **some** towels in the bathroom.  
There aren't **any** towels in the bathroom.  
Are there **any** towels in the bathroom?

- Use **some** and **any** with plural nouns.  
some = you don't say exactly how many.
- some changes to any for - and ?.
