

ROMAN ROADS IN HISPANIA

"All roads lead to Rome"

As the Roman Empire was very big and they needed to move many troops and goods, the Romans built many roads for transportation. Have a look at this map. It shows the Roman Roads (calzadas) of Hispania.



The **Via Augusta** was the longest and busiest of the major roads built by the Romans in Hispania. Approximately 1,500 km long, the Via Augusta was built to link Spain with Italy, running from the interior city of Gades (Cádiz) to the Pyrenees Mountains along inland valleys parallel to the coast of the Mediterranean Sea.

Another important road was **Via de la Plata**. It ran from Emerita Augusta (Mérida) to Asturica Augusta (Astorga) in the west of the Iberian Peninsula.
