PRESENT PERFECT – USES	PAST SIMPLE- USES
-Action that started in the past and has a link to the present I've cleaned the car - It looks new!	-I went there last summer → Once or + in the past
-There is no exact time in which it occurred: ✓ <u>yet</u> Have you seen it <u>yet</u> ? Ya/todavía ?/N	-I/you/he/she/it/we/you/they went → Same form
✓ <u>just</u> I have <u>just</u> heard it Acabo de +	-I played → regular -ed
✓ <u>already</u> Mary has <u>already</u> baked it Ya +	-I didn't → negative form
✓ <u>ever</u> Have you <u>ever</u> been here? Algun a vez ?/N	-Did I infin. → Question form -Remember the order using: ASI: Auxiliary+Subject+Infinitive or QuASI: Question Word+Auxiliary+Subject+Infinitive → Did you go? When did you go?

He got married ten years ago (he is married now)
