East London

Known for its buzzing art scene, trendy hangouts and an overall up-and-coming vibe East London is home to some of the coolest neighborhoods in the city.

There's always things on in the area from bustling street markets to chic cocktail hours.

The first thing that comes to Londoners and tourists' minds alike when you say East London is — **Shoreditch**. The area is filled with

independent shops, thrift stores, pop-ups, and of course, the **Brick Lane**. You'll usually find young professionals here paving their way in the creative industry.

Brick lane today is the heart of the country's Bangladeshi community with the vicinity known to some as Banglatown. It is famous for its many curry houses.

Weekends on Brick Lane are a full-on affair and not for *the faint-hearted* (or severely hangover). *Throngs* descend on the Brick Lane Market to *haggle* over one-of-a-kind clothing and eat at a food market which boasts more cuisines than you can shake a stick at, while a few *badass* buskers playing live music hold crowds in their thrall.

West London



On the opposite end of the spectrum, we've got **West London**. Known for its beautiful houses, West London is the posh-de-le-posh of the capital, and there's always something to do here. From popping into the Natural History Museum to taking a stroll around London Mews here are the best neighborhoods in the area.

They became known as 'mews' after the Royal Mews, a gigantic stables on what is now Trafalgar Square. This curious word (technically, it is 'plural in form but singular in construction') derived from the original use of the stables building which was to house the king's falcons. Falcons moult or mew (from the French verb 'muer'), and the place where they did it was referred to as a mews. Most mews houses have stables and a coach house on the ground floor, the first floor having a hayloft and a couple of rooms where the coach driver and the ostlers could doss down (accommodation for servants in those days was basic to say the least).

SOUTH LONDON

An area of London that doesn't always get the best rep, but South London is a great place to live if you want a local feel to London life. A mix of clubbing hotspots, village-escapes (and randomly home to a lot of Australians), here are the best neighborhoods in South London. The phrase "south London" refers to the area **south of the Thames**. It's a broad term and not always a precise one. It encompasses a wide variety of neighborhoods and geographies, from the South Bank with its big attractions to up-and-coming areas like **Deptford** that are popular with hipsters.



Greenwich is where hemispheres meet and is home to a World Heritage Site, The O2 entertainment venue, London's only cable car and London's oldest Royal Park.. An area of London that feels more like a town than a city, Greenwich is filled with green spaces, rich history, and a total-village vibe.

A beautiful hub of African and Caribbean culture **Brixton** still holds true to its roots of a vibrant London neighborhood with plenty to offer. From thriving Brixton market to some of the best live music in London — it's always a good time.
