FIRST CONDITIONAL

If + present simple, WILL + infinitive	Will + infinitive if + present simple
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - For present or future situations that are possible and probable. - For promises or to give warnings.

Remember! There are other words/expressions that can make a conditional sentence (instead of using IF) → *as soon as / when / as long as / by the time / provided that / only if*

As soon as *I have enough money, I will buy you the sneakers.*

When *we arrive at the airport, our parents will meet us.*

*You won't be cold **as long as** you wear enough warm clothes.*

By the time *Dad gets home, it will be too late to go to the supermarket.*

Provided that *you are feeling better tomorrow, we will go to the beach in the morning.*

Only if *you're feeling well tomorrow, we will go to the beach.*
