1. The Chavs

A nerd is a person seen as overly intellectual, obsessive, introverted or lacking social skills. Such a person may spend inordinate amounts of time on unpopular, little known, or non-mainstream activities, which are generally either highly technical, abstract, or relating to topics of science fiction or fantasy. Additionally, many so-called nerds are described as being shy, pedantic and unattractive. Originally derogatory, the term "nerd" was a stereotype, but later it has been reclaimed and redefined as a term of pride and group identity. However, the augmentative terms, 'geek' and 'dork', have not experienced a similar positive drift in meaning and usage.

6. The "E"

Teenagers created one more subculture in the late 2010s. Eboys and Egirls emerged on Chinese social media app TikTok, where Gen Z has flocked to participate in hashtagged challenges and lipsyncing videos. Though the trend is for the young, it harkens back to subcultures of the past, combining elements of grunge with skater style, and even goth gloom.
