Since 1965, September 8 has been a day of international celebration. Each year on this date, people all over the world celebrate International Literacy Day. *Literacy* refers to the ability to read and write.

This is not a holiday to commemorate a historic or religious event. Instead, on this day, people celebrate the value of reading, writing, and learning.

The goal of this day is to focus attention on education and literacy issues. According to the United Nations, about 875 million adults worldwide do not know how to read or write. More than 110 million children do not have access to education. On International Literacy Day, individuals, organizations, and nations remember the importance of teaching people to read and write, and of providing education to all.

A big theme on this day is "Think Globally, Act Locally." This means that while people should consider literacy issues all over the world, they can start to make a difference in their own city or community. Here are some activities that people do to celebrate:

- get involved in local literacy projects
- give a book as a gift
- volunteer to read to patients in a hospital
- read books aloud to family and friends
- ask your friends about books that have been important in their lives
- help a child write and draw pictures for a book
- recommend a favorite book to a friend
