The next time you're in a public place, look around you. See any video cameras? You might be surprised to discover just how often a camera is recording you without your knowledge. Public surveillance—watching people in public places with video cameras—is getting more common around the world. Police departments position cameras around parks, public squares, and sidewalks to help identify criminals—people who are breaking the law. Businesses also install cameras to monitor the actions of their employees and customers.
