

Definite and Indefinite Articles

(a, an, the)

In English there are three articles: a, an, and the. Articles are used before nouns or noun equivalents and are a type of adjective. The definite article (the) is used before a noun to indicate that the identity of the noun is known to the reader. The indefinite article (a, an) is used before a noun that is general or when its identity is not known. There are certain situations in which a noun takes no article.

Definite article

The definite article is used before singular and plural nouns when the noun is specific or particular.

the (before a singular or plural noun)

There are two ways to pronounce "the." One pronunciation sounds like /ðə/ ("thuh," rhymes with "duh") and the other sounds like /ði/ ("thee," rhymes with "free"). The pronunciation of the word "the" depends on the first sound of the word that comes after it.

Indefinite article

An indefinite article is an article that refers to a noun without specifying it or refers to a noun to introduce it for the first time.

a (before a singular noun beginning with a consonant sound)

an (before a singular noun beginning with a vowel sound)

Example: **a** boy, **an** apple

Rules	Count Nouns	Non Count Nouns
Specific identity not known	a, an	(No articles)
Specific identity known	the	the
All things or things in general	(No articles)	(No articles)

Non count nouns are those which usually cannot be counted. Following are some common examples: milk, oil, beauty, Spanish, fun, air, and more.

Examples:

I have **a** dog (one dog).

The dog is very friendly (the dog that I have already mentioned).

Dogs make great pets (dogs in general).

I ate **an** apple yesterday. **The** apple was juicy and delicious.

No Articles:

- Don't use an article with possessive adjectives. For example, "She's my friend" and not "She's a my friend."
- Don't use an article with a general topic.
- Don't put an article in front of country names except when they include 'kingdom', 'states' and 'lands'.
