

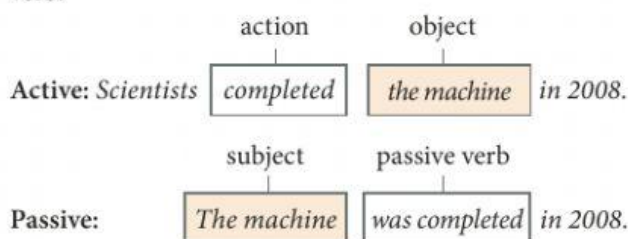
## The Hadron Collider

➤ The Hadron Collider is the largest machine in the world. It was planned by over 10,000 scientists in 100 different countries. The science of the Hadron Collider is so complex that its purpose still isn't fully understood by most of the general public. The machine's purpose is to fire sub-atomic particles at each other. Scientists think that by doing this, the origins of the universe might be discovered. However, since it was completed in 2008, it has suffered a number of technical setbacks. One theory for these has been that the problems are being caused by future time – that's one theory that even most of the scientists don't understand!



## Presentation

Use the passive form when you want to focus on the person or thing affected by the action of the verb. The subject of the passive verb is the object of the active verb:



The passive is often used when *the agent* (who or what did the action) ...

- is unknown: *It was built in 1990 by someone.*
- is obvious or has already been mentioned: *Scientists fire atoms so that the origins of the universe might be discovered by scientists.*
- is not important: *The machine has been fixed by someone.*
- refers to people in general: *More information about the Hadron Collider can be found by you at [www.lhc.ac.uk](http://www.lhc.ac.uk).*
- doesn't want to be known, in order to avoid criticism or embarrassment: *I'm afraid the machine has been broken by me.* (= The speaker either did this or is protecting the person responsible.)

## Tenses and modal verbs

To form the passive, use *to be* + *past participle*:

|                                 |  |
|---------------------------------|--|
| present / past simple           | Scientists <b>test/tested</b> the machine. →<br>The machine <b>is/was</b> tested.  |
| present / past continuous       | Scientists <b>are/were developing</b> a new machine. →<br>A new machine <b>is/was being</b> developed.   |
| present / past perfect          | Scientists <b>have/had made</b> a new discovery.<br>→ A new discovery <b>has/had been</b> made.  |
| present, future and past modals | Scientists <b>may discover</b> the origins of the universe. →<br>The origins of the universe <b>may be discovered</b> .<br>Scientists <b>will be testing</b> the theory. →<br>The theory <b>will be being</b> tested.<br>Scientists <b>might have discovered</b> the origins of the universe. →<br>The origins of the universe <b>might have been discovered</b> . |

\*Note that perfect continuous forms in the passive are rarely used.

You cannot use the passive form with intransitive verbs (e.g. *arrive, die, go, sit*) because they have no direct object: *The tests went well.* (not *The tests are gone well.*)
