We use **there is** (or **there's**) with a singular noun, and **there are** with a plural noun.

There's a big present from her mother and father on the table.

There are some people at the skatepark.

Negative forms are **there isn't** and **there aren't**.

There isn't a car in the park, and there aren't any bicycles.
