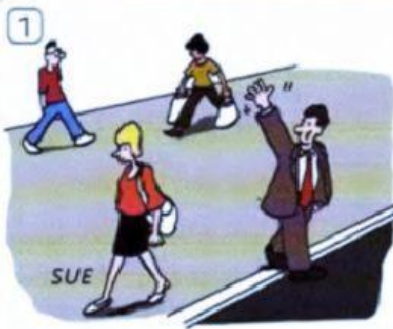


# PAST CONTINUOUS VS SIMPLE PAST

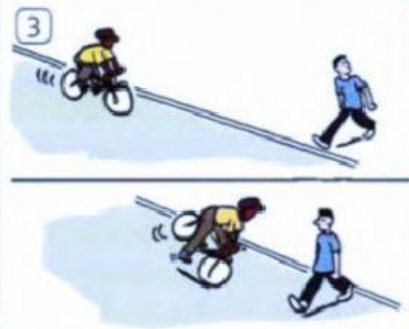
Put the verb into the correct form, past continuous or past simple.



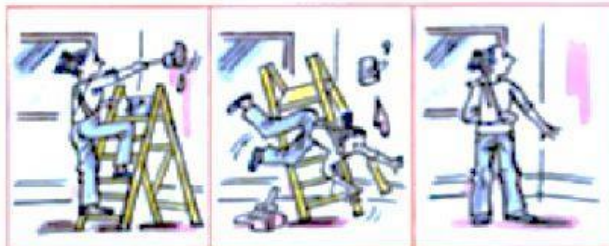
I saw (see) Sue in town yesterday, but she \_\_\_\_\_ (not / see) me. She \_\_\_\_\_ (look) the other way.



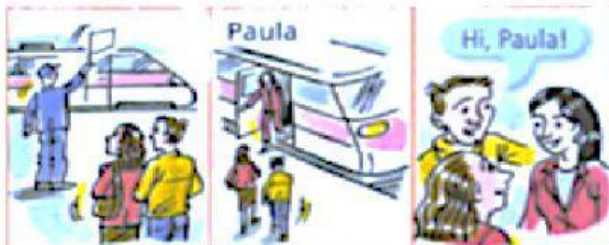
