



GRAMMAR IN CONTEXT Reported questions

In reported questions, we report what someone has asked. We use verbs such as *ask*, *want to know*, and *wonder*. We generally use an object pronoun after *ask*.

We usually use the past tense of the reporting verb, e.g., *asked* or *wondered*, and change the tense as we do in reported statements.

To report a *wh-* question, we use:

ask + (object) + question word + clause (with affirmative word order)

"Why didn't I enjoy myself?" (past tense) → I wondered why I hadn't enjoyed myself. (past perfect)

Note that the subject comes before the verb, and we do not use the auxiliary verb *do*.

To report a *yes/no* question, we use:

ask + (object) + *if* or *whether* + clause (with affirmative word order)

"Has this word changed your life?" → My friend asked me if this word had changed my life.
