

Unit 1. Me, myself and I

Present Perfect

We use the **present perfect tenses** to **connect the present with the past**.

The email has just arrived (it was sent in the past and it is here now).

She has been looking for him for months (she started looking for him in the past and is still looking for him).

I've been hanging out with Jade for some time now (I started hanging out with her in the past and I still am now).

PRESENT PERFECT SIMPLE	PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS
Have/has + past participle	Have/has + been + v + ing

A recent event with connection to the present. <i>I have just fallen down.</i> 4. We use it to focus on the result of the action. <i>I have painted my living room.</i> 5. We use it to talk about how many times. <i>They've met three times.</i>	1. Repeated actions in the past. <i>My sister has been posting pictures.</i> 2. To focus on the duration of the action. <i>I have been painting the living room all morning.</i> 3. When we see the results (see, hear, smell, hear) of the action. <i>I've been eating dinner, so there are plates all over the table.</i> 4. To emphasize that something is temporary. <i>She's been running a lot recently. (She doesn't usually do this).</i>
