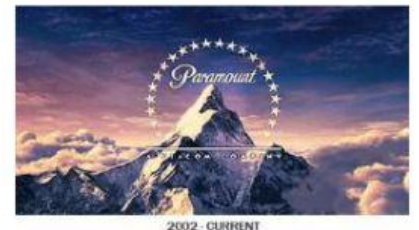

__ So, here is the deal. Hitch would direct Psycho for free. He'll make it with his TV crew, he'll make it fast and he'll make it cheap.

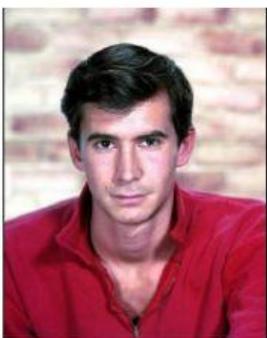
