THE COLOURS OF TRAVEL

A.

The room is basic, but thankfully clean. There is a small balcony which looks onto a narrow street. There is another small hotel across the street, *Étoile*, with stars painted onto blue-grey shutters, whose colour reminds me of my Siamese cat, Spud, back home. I wonder how Spud is getting on with my neighbour's young children. We are close to a food market, just as we intended when looking for a room. We go to a café nearby for coffee, eat *pain au chocolat* and watch the Parisians go by. This puts us in a relaxed mood for our trip to the Musée Rodin, where we take out our sketchbooks to draw our favourite Rodin sculptures. I choose a sculpture of a pair of hands which turns out to be trickier than I thought it would be to draw.

B.

There are vivid colours everywhere: flowers painted onto the backs of trucks along with funny messages, women in *saris* or *salwar kameez* of every imaginable colour and multicoloured spices and fruit in the street markets. A green and yellow auto rickshaw beeps its horn and I jump out of its way. I haven't yet figured out the rules of the road and the same is true for the camel coming up the road on the wrong side. Delhi brings all the senses to life. The smell coming from a street stall tempts me and I stop to have a look. The *Aloo Tikki*, a golden-fried potato, is delicious but I quickly decide to go easy on the dip, which sets my mouth on fire.

C.

We arrive at the bridge and I still haven't made up my mind whether or not I will jump; I need to have some more information. We're working on my best friend's wish list of things to try before he turns thirty. Swimming with

dolphins, learning Italian and bungee jumping are the remaining three wishes. The bungee jump operator explains to Johnny what to do and hooks him up to the rope, counting down slowly 5-4-3-2... but he is so excited that he jumps before the operator has reached one. Johnny's arms are stretched out and he shouts out as his body flies down towards the water. Johnny's red jacket stands out against the blue and the tips of his fingers splash into the river, before the rope snaps him back upwards.

D.

Gary hugs one of the stones while I take a photograph. The sky behind him is breathtaking. The Ring of Brodgar is not in the slightest bit disappointing, unlike other stone circles we have visited; in fact, it's quite the opposite. Perhaps it is the colour of the stone and moss or that the shapes of the stones are all different and look a little like people. Whatever it is, this place really is enchanting. We walk around the outside of the stones, stopping to look at each stone and feel its rough surface. There are few other tourists, so we are able to enjoy the site leisurely. Thinking on it now, Orkney is probably one of the most interesting places in Scotland, with this ancient stone circle being one of its highlights.
