ZERO Conditional

FACTS



RULES

If you leave it on, the battery runs out.



ZERO Conditional

If Gerrard **throws** a stone into a river, it **sinks**.



If you **press** the switch, the computer **comes** on.



FIRST Conditional

A possible situation in the future



If Luffy gives Chopper a toy, he will be happy.

Predicting a likely result in the future (if the condition happens)



FIRST Conditional



What will you do if your computer doesn't work?

If you come over, I'll make some coffee.

I will make some coffee if you come over.





SECOND Conditional

If I were tiny I would



If **I were** tiny, I **would sleep** on a marshmallow.

Sleep on a marshmallow



SECOND Conditional

USES

Unreal situations in the present




If **I were** a teacher, I **would not assign** too much homework.



SECOND Conditional

USES

Impossible present situations



I **would go** to the party if I **didn't have** to work.



SECOND Conditional

USES

Imagined events



If I **were** his girlfriend, I **would fall** on his shoulder.



THIRD Conditional



Already
PASSED

Will NEVER
happen!

If I **had bought** the lottery, I **would have won** the price.
