



a) Read these class notes:

**MANY** means "muchos / muchas"; it is always plural; it is used in front of a noun:

Many computers are infected by a virus every day.

**MUCH** means "mucho / mucha"; it is always singular; it is used in front of a noun (not normally in affirmative sentences):

20 Gb hard disk space isn't (very) much for a modern computer.

**VERY** means "muy"; it is used in front of an adjective:

This computer is very old.

I like this laptop very much.

**REALLY** can be used instead of VERY to emphasise an adjective which is not gradable:

Computer sales this month are really disastrous.

**TOO** means "demasiado"; it is used in front of an adjective:

This computer is too old to run this program.  
Those files are too large for my pendrive.  
£150 is too much for a second-hand computer.  
Too many open programs can make your computer too slow.

NB: TOO can also mean "también", but then it is always at the end of the sentence:

This mouse is too expensive, too.
