

Modal Verbs to Express Suggestions and Obligations

Review the rules about using the modal verbs *should*, *must*, and *have to* below. Then complete the exercises that follow.

SHOULD

- to give advice, suggestions, recommendations
- form: should + base verb
- negative: shouldn't + base verb
- question: Should + subject + base verb

HAVE TO

- to express obligation or necessity
- can be used in past, present, or future
- form: have/has to + base verb
- questions: Do/does + subject + have to + base verb

MUST

- to express obligation; something that is extremely necessary
- form: must + base verb

DON'T/DOESN'T HAVE TO

- to express that there is no obligation; you are not required to do something, but you can if you want to

MUST NOT

- to express prohibition
- form: must not + base verb
