PIRATE RADIO

Today, music is easily available to us all. No matter what our taste is – whether we like soul, blues, pop, reggae, urban or any other type of music – we can tune into a radio station and hear it, or go online and download it. But it hasn't always been that easy.

When pop and rock music was starting to become very popular in the 1960s, there weren't many radio stations at the time that only played music, and the few that did weren't playing the type of music that young people really wanted to hear. The BBC radio presenters were allowed less than an hour a day. What happened next had an enormous effect not only on the musical tastes of generations of young people but also on the development of music itself. Pirate radio was born.

So, what exactly was and is pirate radio? The name speaks for itself. DJs started to broadcast non-stop music from boats at sea. By transmitting

from international waters, the DJs weren't breaking any laws and the government couldn't close them down. However, a lot of people didn't like this. One reason was that pirate radio was competing with normal radio stations for audiences, but there was another reason too. The DJs on the boats had a very relaxed way of presenting and there were a lot of stories about the way they lived on the boats. They were blamed for badly influencing a whole generation of teenagers. Parents and politicians alike were very angry!

The film *The Boat That Rocked*, which came out in 2009, shows the life on board one of these pirate ships in great detail. Although the film did badly financially at the box office, it is well worth watching for anyone interested in the 1960s and its music. It is supposed to be based on the life of DJs on one of the first pirate ships, 'Radio Caroline'. This ship started broadcasting in 1964. The



most important thing we learn from the film is not about the easy, casual lifestyle of the DJs. It's about their love of music and their desire to share this with the listeners. They really wanted to bring new sounds and new talent to radio.

A new law in 1967 banned pirate radio at sea, but some ships and land-based pirate stations continue to broadcast illegally today. They mainly play music for minority groups, who still can't hear the type of music they love from the normal stations. The pirate radio stations are part of our musical history and without them, who knows what sort of music we'd be listening to today!

A VIRTUAL CHOIR

Enjoy singing? Then read on for something that may interest you! If you like music, in particular classical music, you may have heard of Eric Whitacre. He is a popular composer and conductor from Nevada, USA, who has written some wonderful music over the last twenty years. This music bridges the gap between traditional classical music of composers like Mozart or Tchaikovsky and the popular music that people enjoy today. However, you may know his name for a different reason. Eric Whitacre created the Virtual Choir, whose videos have been seen on YouTube by more than six million people.

Choirs have become very popular in recent years and have even been featured on reality TV shows, where choirs of different sizes, singing different types of music compete in front of

judges to be voted for by the viewers and win the Best Choir prize. These choirs may have between five and fifty members. But Eric's Virtual Choir is something very different indeed! In 2009 a young girl, called Britlin Losee, sent Eric a video of herself singing a piece of his music. Eric was hugely impressed by the video and put it on his website and then he had an amazing idea. What if hundreds of other people did the same thing? Suppose he asked people to record themselves singing the same song and send the videos to him? Eric could then put all the voices together to create an enormous virtual choir!

This thought led Eric on an incredible journey. After using 185 voices on his first virtual choir video in 2010, he became more and more ambitious.

Last year he recorded his song, *Fly to Paradise*, with the voices and faces of 5,905 people from 101 countries! The participants are in ages range from six years old to ninety-eight. And they come from countries as far apart as the north of Norway and New Zealand. The *Fly to Paradise* video is amazing. The singers' faces appear on thousands of windows in skyscraper buildings as they sing, and the soundtrack of their five thousand voices is unimaginably moving. The song is five minutes long but the credits that list the people in the video go on for eight minutes! It is incredible to think that each voice was recorded on a different webcam, smartphone or tablet in a bedroom, bathroom or basement. Do you want your voice to be heard?
