When Life Gives You Lemons...

Lemonade is a lemon-flavored drink sweetened with sugar. In different parts of the world, there are variations on the drink and its name. Pink lemonade and frozen lemonade are also prepared. Limeade substitutes out the lemons for limes. In North America, lemonade is usually made from lemon juice, water, and sugar. It is often home-made.

Slices of lemon are sometimes added to a pitcher as a garnish and for flavoring. It can be made fresh from fruit, from frozen juice, dry powder, or liquid concentrate. It can be colored in a variety of shades. It can also be frozen into a slush or Popsicle-type dessert. Artificially sweetened and artificially flavored versions are also popular.

Lemonade is a delicious treat in the summer weather and no matter the flavor, people generally love this beverage!

RECIPE CARD

Materials

- 🍋 3 Lemons
- 🍋 1/4 to 1 cup sugar
- 🍋 5 cups water
- 🍋 ice
- 🍋 pitcher



Steps:

1. Squeeze 3 lemons in a pitcher to make 1/2 c. of lemon juice.
2. Add 5 cups of water to the pitcher and stir.
3. Add sugar to the pitcher in small amounts to get the taste desired.
4. Put mixture in the refrigerator for 5 minutes to chill.
5. Add ice to the pitcher and enjoy!
