<b>Subject + have/has + past participle</b>  I <b>have been</b> in Paris.	<b>Subject + have not (haven't) / has not (hasn't) + past participle</b>  I <b>haven't been</b> in Paris.	<b>Have/has + subject + past participle</b>  Have I <b>been</b> in Paris?
