


FEW- A FEW

A FEW: some, a small amount
Plural countable nouns
(biraz, küçük bir miktar)
(sayılabilir çoğul isimler)


e.g.: We have **a few apples**, so you can share it with your siblings.

LITTLE - A LITTLE



LITTLE: not much, almost nothing
Uncountable nouns
(çok değil, nedeysse hiç yok)
(sayılamayan isimler)

e.g.: The baby has **little milk**. Can you go and buy some?



A LITTLE some, a small amount
Uncountable nouns
(biraz, az miktarda)
(sayılmayan isimler)

e.g.: We have **a little milk**, it is enough to bake a cake.
