To talk about the future, we use **will**, **going to**, **the present simple** and the **present continuous**.

We use \_\_\_\_\_ to say what we know or believe about the future (often with maybe, I think, I expect and I hope).

We use \_\_\_\_\_ when the speaker decides something at the moment he/she speaks.

We use \_\_\_\_\_ when we can see that something is certain to happen.

We use \_\_\_\_\_ talk about plans.

We can often use going to or will to talk about the future.

We use will more often when we write, but going to when we speak.

We use the \_\_\_\_\_ for plans already made when we know or guess the time.

We can often use the \_\_\_\_\_ or \_\_\_\_\_ to talk about plans

We use the \_\_\_\_\_ for timetables (trains, planes etc.) and for programmes (films, classes etc.).
