

Historical Background of the Easter Island.

Rapa Nui is an island in the Pacific Ocean off the coast of Chile. Rapa Nui was inhabited for thousands of years by Polynesians who raised crops, built houses, and worshipped gods in nearly complete isolation from the rest of the world. They also created enormous stone statues, moai, that still stand. Carved by skilled craftsmen from quarries inside the Rano Raraku volcano, the statues range from six feet to over 30 feet tall. Archeologists and historians are still not sure how islanders, using simple tools, could have moved the huge statues across several miles and then raised them to a standing position.
