There is even a fancy restaurant that serves 5-course meals. Today many rich people from Paris use the caves as second homes since they are a cool relaxing change from the fast rhythm of the city.



If you travel to some of these places, you can even find some rather expensive hotels that are in caves. In a village in Cappadocia, Turkey, for example, you can stay in an 11-room cave house. All the rooms come with jacuzzi, walk-in wardrobes and 55-screen HD smart TVs with full applications. A double room costs around 800 dollars a night!

"I work at Suzie's, which is one of the most popular restaurants in central London. The best part of working there is being part of a fantastic team of friendly and talented people.

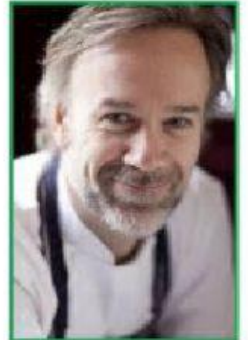
