Flour: a powder obtained by grinding grain, Typically wheat, and used to make bread, etc.

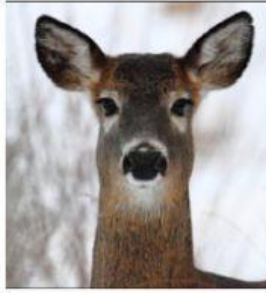
Seam: a long line in which two pieces of fabric are sewn together.
