

The first man on the Moon

Neil Armstrong **was** an American who **became** the first man to ever step on the moon.

Armstrong landed on the moon in July 20, 1969. He **got** off the lunar module Eagle and **said** the famous words, "That's one small step for a man, one giant leap for mankind."

He **travelled** to the moon with pilots Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins on the Apollo 11 Spacecraft. There **were** complications at the time of landing. The landing module **was coming** in faster than planned, but with some quick thinking, Armstrong **prevented** a disaster and saved the mission.



Armstrong and Aldrin **were** outside of the Eagle module on the moon surface for only a little over two hours. While he **was** there, Armstrong **took** some dirt of the ground, **put** up an American flag, and **talked** to the President of the United States, Richard Nixon.

After the moon-landing mission, Armstrong **retired** from NASA and **became** a teacher at a University. A crater on the moon **was** named after him. He never **returned** to space.

On August 25, 2012 US astronaut Neil Armstrong, the first man on the Moon, **died** of complications from heart surgery. He was 82 years old.
