PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS

POSITIVE SENTENCES

- a) She **has been working** two Jobs for the last six months.
- b) I've **only been spending** money.
- c) Steve **has been trying** to become an actor.
- d) He's **been taking** courses since he graduated.

NEGATIVE SENTENCES

- e) We **haven't been going** out much.
- f) My friend **hasn't been sleeping** well.

QUESTIONS

- g) How long **have you been studying**?
- h) What **has she been doing** lately?
- i) **Have you been working** late? – Yes, I have. / No, I haven't.

The present perfect continuous uses the auxiliary verb ...

- a) **HAVE** or **HAS**. b) **VERB TO BE**. c) **GERUND**.

For negative sentences, we use...

- a) **DIDN'T** b) **AREN'T** or **ISN'T**. c) **HAVEN'T** or **HASN'T**.

The present perfect continuous expresses...

a) FINISHED ACTIONS.

b) AN ACTION THAT STARTED IN THE PAST AND CONTINUES IN THE PRESENT.

The present perfect continuous is formed...

a) HAVE / HAS + BEEN + VERB IN -ING

b) HAVE + VERB IN PAST.

3. Choose the correct response.

a) Have you been watching that program lately?

Yes, I am. I'm watching now.

Yes, I have. I've been watching it a lot.

b) What has Sandra been doing these days?

She's been taking karate classes.

No, she hasn't. She is just sleeping.

c) Has your neighbor been making parties all week?

No, she didn't go out.

Yes, and she has been inviting many people.

Note: The present perfect continuous is used to express an action that started in the past and continues in the present.

I've been practicing ballet since I was a child.

<The action continues in the present.>
