

PAST SIMPLE

Form: verb + ED or irregular verbs.

Use: a completed action in the past. (a fact, a habit or a duration.)

- I lived in England for 30 years.
- I saw Bob yesterday.

We use "Did" to make questions and "didn't" for negatives. The verb stays in the base form.

- Did you see Bob? She didn't see Bob.

PAST CONTINUOUS

Form: was/were + verb + ing

Use: interrupted action in the past, specific time, parallel actions, atmosphere

- I was having a shower when the phone rang.
- At 4 p.m. yesterday I was playing tennis.
- Were you listening while he was talking?
- When I woke up this morning, the sun was shining and the birds were singing.
