Use **possessives** when writing to show that a person, place, or thing has or owns something.

Singular Nouns

Add -'s

The cow's milk.
Ms. Smith's pen.
The city's buildings.

Plural Nouns

Ending in -s

Add -'

The flowers' petals.
The stars' light.
The dogs' puppies.

Plural Nouns NOT

Ending in -s

Add -'s

The children's toys.
The women's clothes.
The men's cars.

Prepositions help to join words and ideas. They tell about a noun or pronoun and another word in a sentence. Some tell about the time or place. Others tell how.


