<i>Uses</i>	When we focus on time (since – for)	When we focus on numbers
<i>Forms</i>	Has / have + been + v (ing)	Has / have + p.p
<i>example</i>	I have been running for one hour	I have ran three time last week
<i>Question</i>	How long have you been running?	How many times have you ran?
<i>negative</i>	I haven't been running for one hour	I haven't ran three times last week
