

- ***some / any + plural nouns***

- ***a / an, some and any***

- We often use *there is / isn't* with *a / an*: There is a sofa. / There isn't an armchair.
- We often use *there are / there aren't* with *some* and *any*: There are some chairs. / There aren't any neighbours.
- We use *some* and *any* with plural nouns. *Some* = not an exact number, e.g. *There are some eggs in the fridge*.
- We use *some* in affirmative [+] sentences, and *any* in negative [-] and interrogative [?].
