


## ACROSS or THROUGH?

A verb followed by **ACROSS** or **THROUGH** means "traverser".

- **ACROSS** is used when it is about an area in 2 dimensions.
- **THROUGH** is used when it is about an area in 3 dimensions

For example : *across* the fields / *through* the forest

 when you swim, you swim across, not ~~through~~.
