

Permit, Allow, Let

1. Look at the modals in **bold** in the following example sentences and study the rules below:

1 The security system will not **permit** you to enter without the correct password.

2 We **are not allowed to** return to the office yet.

3 I would not **allow** a child to have a TV or a computer in their room.

4 **Let** me pay for the meal.

Rules:

Permit, allow and **let** all have a similar meaning: "give permission or make it possible for somebody to do something".

Permit is often used for official public notices.

We use **permit / allow + object + "to" infinitive**: Example 1.

We use **let + object + infinitive without "to"**: Example 4.

We sometimes use permit / allow + noun: *I was allowed access to their data.*

We often use **permit** and **allow** in the passive form:

It is not permitted to go to the office.

We are not allowed to go to the office.

We don't normally use **let** in the passive form.
