Living underground in New York

Mark Johnson has worked for the New York Daily News since he was 19. At the moment, he is investigating New York's freedom tunnels. He is getting really interesting information about them. The editor of the newspaper is eager to publish this piece of information soon.

The number of homeless people living in New York increases every year and is probably 150,000. However, few of us have heard of 'the mole people' – a group of about 7,000 individuals who live underground in railway tunnels that are not used. Some of them have lived underground for over twenty years. They don't like the name 'mole people'. 'We are not moles, we are people. We call this the freedom tunnel,' says Charlie.

Life underground is not that easy, and the inhabitants of the tunnels are proud that they are self-sufficient. They don't beg for money, but they go above ground to make a living. They collect tins in the street and take them to a recycling plant in exchange for a few dollars. They help clean the stairs of apartment buildings. Some collect and sell second-hand books. Unfortunately the city council wants to develop the public transport system and they are planning to move the people out of the tunnels. It is therefore possible that they will be truly 'homeless' again.
