

LITERAL AND FIGURATIVE MEANING

Literal Meaning: when a word is used with its normal meaning, it is being used in its strict dictionary meaning, in a situation (or context) that “makes sense” from a purely logical point of view.

Examples: The robber struck me on the arm with a piece of wood.
Be careful! That knife is very sharp.

Figurative Meaning: when a word is used with a special, non-literal meaning, we say that it is used in a figurative sense (or with a figurative meaning).

Examples: As I was walking pass I was struck with an idea.
He has a very sharp tongue.
