I'd rather (would rather) study English than (study) French. If the verb is the same, it usually is not repeated after than.

Would rather expresses PREFERENCE. The base form of the verb follows both would rather and than.

| • | I'd rather do judo karate. (I prefer doing judo to doing karate.) |

| • | I'd listen to music than watch TV. (I prefer listening to music to watching TV.) |
| • | My mother would rather the bus than walk. (My mother prefers taking the bus to walking.) |
| • | They (long form) rather have the strawberries by themselves than with cream. (They prefer strawberries by themselves to having them with cream.) |
| • | Would you like to go out for dinner tonight? ~ I think I'd rather eat at home at a restaurant. |
| • | Would you rather drink water or soda with the curry? ~ I'd rather water than soda. |
| • | Shall we go to the park or stay at home? ~I (short form) rather stay at home than go to the park. |
