

Predicates

- You can combine two sentences by joining two subjects or two predicates with *and* or *or*.
- A **compound subject** contains two or more simple subjects that have the same predicate.
- A **compound predicate** contains two or more simple predicates that have the same subject.

Read each set of sentences. Rewrite each set as one sentence. Combine the compound subject or compound predicate in each pair with *and* or *or*.

1. The doctors helped her. Wilma's mother helped her.

2. The doctors told Wilma to do her exercises. She would never walk.

3. Wilma took off her brace. She walked into the church.

4. Her family was amazed to see her walk. Her friends were amazed to see her walk.

5. Wilma smiled when she sat down. Wilma sang when she sat down.

6. Wilma could have kept the brace on. She could learn to walk without it.
