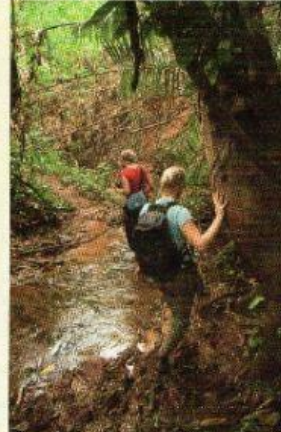
♦ Go on an expedition
