Practice

Summarizing is briefly stating in your own words the main points in a piece of writing. Pausing to summarize what you have read helps you to check your understanding before you read further. A good summary is much shorter than the original. It includes only the main idea and the most important details.

In space, the much weaker gravity makes the human body change in many unexpected ways. In microgravity, your blood is rerouted, flowing from the legs, which become thin and sticklike, to the head, which swells up. The extra liquid in your head makes you feel like you're hanging upside down or have a stuffed-up nose.
