Prosthetics are common in general dentistry. Patients with missing or damaged teeth require **artificial replacements**. Dentists use numerous materials and **appliances** as substitutions for real teeth.

One type of prosthetic is a **crown**. Crowns are usually fixed and made of metal and/or **porcelain**. Dentists often use them to help strengthen existing teeth. However, sometimes crowns are used to replace missing teeth.

More often, **bridges** and **implants** replace missing teeth. Bridges cover a row of lost teeth. They are usually **removable**. Implants, on the other hand, are **fixed**.

Dentures are another common dental prosthetic. They are suggested for patients who are missing all or most of their teeth. **Partial dentures** are for those who need to replace missing teeth in an **arch**.

Veneers are fixed cosmetic prosthetics. They are made of porcelain or **plastic**. Dentists use them to improve discolored, crooked, or slightly chipped teeth.
