

BRING and TAKE

BRING

We ask people to bring things to the place where we are.

Bring is used in relation to a **destination**:

TAKE

We take things to the place we are going to.

We take them from the place where we are to another place.

Take is used in relation to a **starting point**.

Attention

Read the following sentences

Bring a jumper with you in case it gets cold.

Take a jumper with you in case it gets cold.

Both can be correct.

In the former example, the meaning is to carry the jacket with you to where you are going. This could be something the person you're joining would say to you.

In the latter example, the meaning is to take it away from your starting point. It sounds like something Mom would say as you're running out of the house.
