We use **has to** / **have to** like this:

We use **don't have to** / **doesn't have to** like this:

We <b>have to</b> do homework.	I <b>don't have to</b> clean the table.
I <b>have to</b> clean the table.	We <b>don't have to</b> take out the rubbish.
They <b>have to</b> cut the grass.	They <b>don't have to</b> wash the car.
You <b>have to</b> visit the dentist.	You <b>don't have to</b> go to the library.
John <b>has to</b> water the plants.	Nora <b>doesn't have to</b> rake the leaves.
She <b>has to</b> go shopping.	She <b>doesn't have to</b> set the table.
Sara <b>has to</b> do the washing-up.	Nathan <b>doesn't have to</b> clean the house.
He <b>has to</b> shovel the snow.	He <b>doesn't have to</b> feed the fish.
