	IF CLAUSE	+	MAIN CLAUSE
ZERO Conditional Used to talk about things that are generally true or scientific facts.	If + present simple If the weather is good, If it rains, If you freeze water,	...	present simple I go to the beach. the grass gets wet. it turns into ice.
FIRST Conditional Used to talk about a possible condition and its probable result in the future.	If + present simple If the weather is good tomorrow, If you don't hurry, If I have enough time,	...	will + infinitive I will go to the beach. you will miss the train. I will exercise.
SECOND Conditional Used to talk about an unlikely or hypothetical condition and its probable result now or in the future.	If + past simple If the weather was good, If I had a lot of money, If you went to bed earlier,	...	would + infinitive I would go to the beach. I would travel around the world. you wouldn't be so tired.
THIRD Conditional Used to talk about an imaginary condition and its probable result in the past.	If + past perfect If the weather had been good, If you hadn't eaten so much, If I had studied harder,	...	would have + past participle I would have gone to the beach. you wouldn't have felt sick. I would have passed the exam.
